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Having lost many close friends and dance colleagues due to HIV and AIDS, Keith Elliott, a member of Joseph Holmes Chicago Dance Theatre (JHCDT), felt it was time for Chicago dancers to take an active role in preventing the spread of the disease. Keith's idea — both brilliant and simple — was to bring Chicago's dance community together for one night each year, to Dance for Life.

In 1991, Keith and Todd Kiech began working to make Dance for Life a reality, enlisting JHCDT associate artistic director Harriet Ross to give their event the creative force required to make a significant impact. HIV/AIDS community activist and skilled fundraiser Danny Kopelson joined the project the following year, along with Hubbard Street Dance Chicago executive director Gail Kalver. The inaugural Dance for Life (DFL) was held in June 1992 at the Organic Theatre. Every seat was sold.

In the years following, annual DFL performances filled the Athenaeum Theatre, the Skyline Stage at Navy Pier, The Harris Theater for Music and Dance, and at the Auditorium Theatre of Roosevelt University, each selling out weeks in advance. DFL is proud to be held tonight at the Jay Pritzker Pavilion.

Over the past 30 years, 33 Chicago-based, professional dance companies and numerous choreographers have been presented at DFL, supporting and showcasing the city's unique diversity of talent, dance traditions and styles. DFL remains the only annual opportunity for the incredibly talented, world-renowned professional dancers of Chicago to unite artistically to help those affected by health through The Dancers' Fund. Dancers, companies and choreographers generously donate their time, energy and artistry to the cause. Millions of dollars have been raised by DFL since 1992, for the AIDS Foundation of Chicago, The Dancers' Fund, and 24 other AIDS prevention, treatment and advocacy organizations in Chicago. DFL has supported and helped produce several spin-off events.

In 1994, Board Member Harriet Ross created the Dance For Life Fund, later known as the Dancers Fund. The Fund provides assistance to any member of the professional Chicago dance community facing critical health issues. In response to the changing needs of Chicago's dance community, evolutions in the nature of HIV/AIDS, the growth of the annual event and its other programs, DFL has matured into a nonprofit organization, Chicago Dancers United.

Chicago Dancers United

Chicago Dancers United is a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt charitable organization that provides financial relief for preventative health care and critical medical needs for Chicago dance industry professionals.

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The Dancers' Fund provides short-term financial assistance to Chicago dance professionals diagnosed with a critical health need. In 2020, we broadened our grantmaking to include support for general health and wellness needs. Although the Fund was created in response to the impact of the HIV/AIDS epidemic on the dance community, its mission has now broadened. The Fund offers assistance in, but not limited to, housing, utilities, insurance, medication and travel. Designed to help qualified individuals meet their financial obligations when faced with health issues, The Dancers' Fund is available to Chicago-based, professionally trained working dancers and those whose primary source of income is derived by serving the dance community. These include, but are not limited to: dancers in a professional dance company, choreographers, dance company full-time administration/production/technical personnel, full-time dance instructors, freelance dancers, musical theatre chorus dancers and full-time class/rehearsal accompanists.

How the Dancers' Fund Works

There are two grant opportunities through the Dancers' Fund:

The **Critical Health Need Grant** helps cover medical expenses related to the diagnosis of a critical health issue. Those expenses include, but are not limited to, doctor and hospital visits, surgery, medical testing, therapy, and medication. Funding of up to \$4,000 is available annually.

The **General Health and Wellness Grant** helps cover non-critical health expenses related to general health and wellness, such as insurance premiums, medical bills, dental bills, and mental health sessions. Funding of up to \$500 is available annually.

Grants are intended for temporary assistance and are paid directly to the collector. Each case is reviewed on an individual basis by a committee comprised of Chicago Dancers United board members. The board reserves the right to alter, amend, modify and change the purpose, categories of assistance, limitations on assistance, eligibility and documentation at any time. Chicago Dancers United does not and shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion (creed), gender, gender expression, age, national origin (ancestry), disability, marital status, sexual orientation, or military status.

In 2020 a second partnership was formed with the American Cancer Society, as more dance professionals were having critical health issue beyond HIV/AIDS. With the funds raised through Dance for Life, AFC and ACS is able to support the efforts of these esteemed organizations to provide medical support, research and advocacy. In Illinois AFC is working to prevent new HIV infections and serve people living with HIV/AIDS.

GIORDANO DANCE CHICAGO

Giordano Dance Chicago (GDC) illuminates beauty and invigorates the world with deep connections. In 59 years as an artistic leader and innovator, Giordano Dance Chicago – one of the longest running jazz dance companies in the world - has contributed greatly to the health of Chicago's performing arts community. From our origins in Gus Giordano's family-run studio to our current incarnation as a professionally-run organization with over a half-century of worldwide performances (27 countries, 46 states, and more than 1,200 cities), our imprint on the art form of jazz dance is far-reaching and significant. Our contributions include: a vast repertoire of more than 175 original works; the mentoring of new and emerging choreographers; the commissioning of innumerable musical scores and production designers; the education of tens of thousands of under-resourced public school and community students; the creation of generations of professional dancers, and performances to millions of audience members worldwide.

Several major factors combine to be the engine behind all programs and which reflect the organization's mission and vision. First, the legacy of founder Gus Giordano suffuses the organization, its mission and its daily activities and cannot be over-emphasized. Second, the leadership of Artistic Director Nan Giordano and Executive Director Michael McStraw has challenged and transformed the organization to continuously raise its standards, take artistic risks, and expand its influence worldwide. Third, GDC recruits, hires, and fosters dance artists who possess more than just superlative technique and experience, but who also convey passion, humanity, and elegance. Lastly, ours is always a passionate and visceral offering which connects profoundly with our audience.

Our mission provides for strong educational programs and services, including teaching the Giordano Technique in residencies in college and university dance programs, as well as the Nan Giordano Certification Program[®] which offers multi-level instruction and certification in the proprietary Giordano Technique. GDC's *Jazz Dance/Science & Health* program, established in 2006, teaches elementary-school anatomy and nutrition curriculum through a dance-centric program in the science classroom over the course of 8 weeks. On average, each year the program provides 300 classes to 450 students in four under-resourced schools.

GDC purchased the Hermon Baptist Church in Lincoln Park/Old Town in January 2018 to serve as its new headquarters. Although plans have been temporarily delayed by the pandemic, the current structure will be modified/rebuilt to eventually house a dance school, multiple dance studios, office space, and an informal performance space.

PARA.MAR Dance Theatre

PARA.MAR Dance Theatre is a Chicago-based contemporary ballet repertory company, founded in 2020 and directed by award-winning choreographer, Stephanie Martinez.

Meaning together, with, and for, "PARA" represents the vision, purpose, and commitment to celebrating identity and creating community through contemporary ballet.

Together, with the belief that inclusion leads to innovation, and that dance is an essential mode of human expression, PARA.MAR's mission is to empower and elevate diverse voices in contemporary ballet by providing performances and programming rooted in artistic excellence, radical accessibility, and reflective of the unique identities of the communities it serves.

HUBBARD STREET DANCE CHICAGO

Hubbard Street Dance Chicago's mission is to bring artists, art and audiences together to enrich, engage, educate and change lives through the experience of dance. HSDC is committed to keeping its dancers creating and finding innovative ways to share exceptional contemporary dance with the community. Now under the artistic direction of Linda-Denise Fisher-Harrell, Hubbard Street Dance Chicago grew out of the Lou Conte Dance Studio in 1977, and Conte served as Artistic Director for 23 years. Hubbard Street offers extensive Education and Adaptive Dance Programs to ensure that residents in every neighborhood of Chicago have access to the benefits of dance. THE JOFFREY BALLET

The Joffrey Ballet is one of the premier dance companies in the world today, with a reputation for boundary-breaking performances for more than 60 years. The Joffrey repertoire is an extensive collection of all-time classics, modern masterpieces, and original works.

Founded in 1956 by pioneers Robert Joffrey and Gerald Arpino, the Joffrey remains dedicated to artistic expression, innovation, and first-rate education and engagement programming. The Joffrey Ballet continues to thrive under The Mary B. Galvin Artistic Director Ashley Wheater MBE and President and CEO Greg Cameron.

MOVEMENT REVOLUTION DANCE CREW

Movement Revolution Dance Crew (MRDC) was founded in 2010 by Chicago native Monternez Rezell. As Artistic Director Monte takes street dance to another level by integrating the street culture into concert dance; all while paying tribute to the founders and originators of the hip hop culture. MRDC performs styles of street dance seen in the hip hop culture including breaking, popping, locking, waving, litefeet, and tricking. MRDC also uses the elements of West African dance, street jazz and contemporary styles to create movement in a way that pushes the limits of dance and creates new possibilities for endless style.

SOUTH CHICAGO DANCE THEATRE

Since the South Chicago Dance Theatre's 2017 launch, the Main Company has toured regionally, nationally and internationally and commissioned the choreographic work of renowned artists. Its collaborative initiatives have included music ensembles, television, opera, art museums and public schools through a range of self-produced and presented performance events. Prioritizing intergenerational learning and exchange, overarching organization's core programs utilize the art of dance to reframe trauma narratives through creative storytelling and replace dominant cultural narratives with community narratives. The art of dance empowers our community to resist oppression and foster collective healing. Amongst SCDT's six core programs are the Main Company and Emerging Artist Program, the Choreography Center, the Education and Community Programs, the South Chicago Arts Administration Fellowship, the annual South Chicago Dance Festival, and the Choreographic Diplomacy Program. In 2018 SCDT received an entrepreneurship award from the Chicago Urban League, a Rising Star Award from the City of Chicago's Department of Cultural Affairs and Special Events, was recently nominated for two Princess Grace USA Awards and accepted into a three year dance leadership cohort sponsored by the Mellon Foundation in partnership with the International Association of Blacks in Dance.

TRINITY IRISH DANCE COMPANY

TRINITY IRISH DANCE COMPANY (TIDC) has significantly changed the direction and scope of Irish dance, re-introducing the art form as the phenomenon it is today. TIDC is constantly in search of an original means of expression while maintaining a high regard for tradition. Founded in 1990, this innovative, nonprofit company was created to celebrate the pioneering work of Founding Artistic Director Mark Howard. Howard's uniquely Irish-American company was the birthplace of progressive Irish dance, an innovative movement genre which opened new avenues of artistic freedom that led directly to commercial productions such as "Riverdance."

By using Irish dance as an instrument and a metaphor, TIDC redefines the medium with passion, flair, and precision. Through the years, TIDC has collaborated with many noted contemporary choreographers, which has led to an increased vocabulary of movement and the development of a new genre of dance. With a unique blend of uncompromising power and grace, TIDC sends a consistent message of female empowerment with a repertory that has elevated the art form for nearly three decades.

Considered an American treasure by critics and enthusiasts worldwide, TIDC has performed sold-out tours in Europe, Asia, and North America, appearing in distinguished venues, such as New York's The Joyce Theater, Washington D.C.'s Kennedy Center, UCLA's Royce Hall, Princeton's McCarter Theater, Ottawa's National Arts Center of Canada, Tokyo's Orchard Hall, and Chicago's Auditorium Theatre, among many others. The Company has travelled to entertain dignitaries as varied as Monaco's royal family, Irish and American presidents, Japanese royalty, and Indian meditation masters.

TIDC holds an important place in the dance world, offering both a highly skilled presentation of traditional Irish step dance and a brilliantly engaging interpretation of contemporary world vision.
